

32m Bibles



A new report by the United Bible Societies (UBS) has shown the distribution of Bibles increased worldwide in 2021.

At least 32.6 million complete Bible editions were distributed last year following the "pandemic-related slump in Bible distribution in the previous year", an increase of 5.5 per cent in 2021 compared to 2020.


Around 20 per cent of all distributed Bibles were downloaded from the internet.

The day 3M accidentally created a force field!



Ever got a shock from a nylon shirt or carpet? When I was a teenager at a Christian holiday centre we discovered that by rubbing our feet on a nylon carpet with our rubber soled shoes, we could generate a static charge which could be released with a satisfying spark and shock from a fingertip to the ear of a friend from behind! Great fun until someone does it to you! Well, here's a tale like that on a grand scale...

Every job has its safety hazards. Whether it's the risk of falling off a telephone pole or tripping over the printer cord, there are always unseen dangers in the workplace. However it's one thing to spill your coffee over your keyboard, quite another to accidentally create a powerful force field that traps your co-workers.

On a humid summer day in 1980, employees at the South Carolina 3M corporation were checking the 50,000 foot rolls of 20ft-wide Polypropylene spools.

This plastic film was being slit, cut, and transferred onto other spools. The thin film was being pulled upwards from a big roll, speeding through 20 feet of overhead rollers before being pulled down to the splitting rollers. This created a cube-shaped tent over the factory floor and employees.

One of the most dangerous aspects besides the fast moving spools was the static charge the rollers produced. This can be measured by the megavolt, giving a powerful shock if you happen to get zapped. However, on an otherwise normal summer day, something strange occurred in the processing plant. An anomaly that no one could have predicted or envisioned.

The static produced by the rollers, combined with the humidity of that day created an invisible wall. A force field

that trapped some employees in a terrifying frozen stance. David Swenson had heard about this from other employees that morning.

Upon entering the room, David's handheld electrometer jolted to life. The needle was at full scale! He felt the static in the air pulling on the hair on his arms and back of the neck.

As he walked closer to the "tent" formed by the operation, he began to feel like he was walking in water. Others were shocked to see David struggle to take a few steps forward, as if being pushed back by a strong wind.

The closer he got, the less he was able to **move.** Eventually the force was so great that he couldn't move forward at all! No matter how much of his weight he used to lean forward, he was frozen inside the force field.

The 3M employees were able to successfully create a full-sized force field by running the Polypropylene spools. The only comment the production manager had for his employees was that he "didn't know whether to fix it or sell tickets."

Once the engineers were able to determine the cause of the strong current of ionized air and static electricity that created this force field, the anomaly stopped. Never to be reproduced in a lab or reported in a manufacturing plant ever again.



Weird Sports


- 1. Auto-polo: Polo played in cars instead of on horses. Popular for about a decade in the early 20th century, but soon lost its appeal.
- Tennis on ice. To make it work today, players would have to revert to old wooden rackets to reduce the speed of play.
- Blindfold Boxing. Still played in some parts of the world such as Phuket (picture), Russia and Thailand (below).
- Cycle Skating—a sort of precursor to roller skates/blading. Parisian men in 1923 loved roller skating, although they did things a bit differently. Strapping one big wheel to each foot worked surprisingly well.
- **Bladderball** conceived by Yale student Philip Zeidman, owner of a six-foot leather exercise ball, as a preliminary event before the Yale-Dartmouth American Football game in 1954. Once each year, at 11 a.m. on a Saturday the inflatable ball was rolled through a Gate onto the Old Campus, where a throng of students waited. At the sound of a whistle, teams from each college and others would fight for possession. Teams could use any means to seize control. There were no rules around what constituted a win and it was common for both teams to declare themselves the winners. In the 1960s a new dimension was added, as teams began to move the ball out of the Campus and through the streets to the Yale president's house, while simultaneously protecting it from city police. As might be expected, the path taken by the ball under the influence of the myriad squads who had prepared for the game with much alcohol, trying to seize possession was not direct. In 1971 the ball rolled a six-mile swath through downtown streets leaving massive traffic tangles and damage in its wake, only to be trapped and deflated by police. The game was banned in 1982 after a series of injuries, the bladderball itself eventually fell into the hands of the Yale Symphony Orchestra. It made a memorable cameo appearance as

- the boulder that chases a hapless student down the Machine City tunnel in a parody of in movie "Raiders of the Lost Ark"in their 1999 Halloween show. An ignominious end to a long if not distinguished career.
- **Extreme ironing**—People are required to go to extreme places and while surfing, trekking to extreme altitudes, or hanging from cliffs, iron clothes. It is one of the most dangerous sports in the world.
- Chess Boxing—is a hybrid sport that combines two traditional disciplines. Two combatants play alternating rounds of blitz (fast) chess and boxing until one wins by checkmate or knockout. It is also possible to win by time penalty as in normal chess, and by boxing decision if there is a draw in the chess round. Typically, events are held in a standard boxing ring using standard amateur boxing equipment and rules. The chess round is also played in the ring with the table, board, and seating being moved in and out of the ring for each round.
- Oil Wrestling-One of the oldest competitions in the world is held in Turkey each June. People coveredin oil try to wrestle the other to the ground. The sport has also became popular in the Netherlands and Japan.
- **Gurning**—People come from various countries to compete to make the ugliest faces in the United Kingdom.
- 10. Toilet Seat Throwing—From Australia, where else?
- 11. Polish Dragon Racing—a sort of tug-ofwar afloat. Two teams of rowers in the same boat compete to take the boat in opposite directions across a line.
- 12. Zorbing—From New Zealand—you just roll down a hill in a large plastic ball! The longest distance travelled in a single roll is held by Steve Camp, of South Africa, who travelled 570 metres (1,870 ft). The fastest sphering ride is held by New Zealand's Keith Kolver, who reached a speed of 52 kilometres per hour (32 mph). There have been fatalities.


